### Investigating A Royal Princess

- Why do you think that the princess declares that she would 'rather be a peasant with a baby at her breast' than a member of the royal family?
  - List the things that are making her unhappy
  - List the contrasts between the rich and the poor that can you find in the poem
- Why do you think that the princess describes the truth as 'naked' and 'vulgar' (line 59)?
  - What associations do you have with the word 'truth'?
  - Why is the truth hidden from the princess?
- What comes to mind when you think of the life of a princess?
  - How does the poem answer these associations and expectations?
- What social injustices make you angry?
  - Are these similar to those injustices that the princess describes?
  - Is there a political situation that is happening at the moment to which this poem could be related?

### Investigating language and tone

- How far can you identify with the princess?
  - Make notes on the various poetic techniques that are used to create empathy for her plight
- To what extent does the dialogue create a sense of drama?
- How does the princess' voice change throughout the poem?
  - Compare the first and the last line.

### Investigating structure and versification

- What other examples can you identify where the rhyme is used to convey a certain meaning and emphasise a particular movement?
- Which rhymes occur in more than one stanza?
  - What is the effect of this?

### Investigating imagery and symbolism

How effective do you find the bird imagery in the poem?

- What further allusions can you find to birds throughout the poem?
- Think especially of the notion of 'cooping' (I. 60) or of being contained
- What do you think that the princess means when she claims that all her walls are 'lost in mirrors'
  - What effect does this have on her understanding of her own identity?
  - What does it prevent her from seeing?

### Investigating themes

- How do you interpret the penultimate line?
- What comments about society do you think that the poem is making?
- What comments do you think that the poem is making about the value and significance of human life?
  - In what way are these comments relevant for the twenty-first century citizen?

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
