## The poetry of Christina

### **Investigating Good Friday**

- What aspects of Good Friday can you identify as encouraging, or potentially encouraging?
- How may a reading of the poem help an individual who is struggling with his or her emotions?
- What aspects of the poem do you find difficult to grasp?
- What associations do you have with the idea of a shepherd?
  - Are these associations met in the poem?
- What associations do you have with the idea of sheep?
  - Are these associations met in the poem?
- Why do you think that the speaker would rather resemble a sheep than a stone?
- Why do you think that the speaker is unable to experience the crucifixion in the same way as the women, Peter or the thief?
  - What is the effect of alluding to the people described in the crucifixion narrative?

### Investigating language and tone

- The speaker addresses Christ in 'O Christ' (I. 2)
  - What is the effect of the 'O' on this line?

How does it contribute to the tone of the poem?

### Investigating structure and versification

- Read through the poem aloud
  - Identify any links between the words that are stressed and the emotion they express
- Look at the shape of the poem on the page
  - What do you notice?

## Investigating imagery and symbolism

- If Christ can 'smite a rock', what else does the speaker suggest he is able to do?
  - How does this make the speaker feel?
- Circle the imagery and symbolism used in the poem
  - Which images do you find the most surprising and why?
- Why do you think that the word 'Blood' is capitalised?
  - What is the effect of the description of it dripping down from the cross?

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### **Investigating themes**

- How much do the speaker's ideas about him/herself change over the course of Good Friday?
- How does s/he perceive him/herself at the end of the poem? How far can the poem be described as one of transformation?

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
