### Investigating L.E.L.

- Think about the fascination with celebrities that exists today
  - What are the possible negative effects of this upon the individual?
    - What do you think would be most difficult to cope with?
  - How do you think that the media can distort an identity?
- Why do you think that Rossetti chose to write a poem in memory of L.E.L.?
  - Do you think that she wanted to:
    - Give her a voice?
    - Associate herself with the earlier poet?
    - Emphasise the destruction that focusing on superficial appearances can cause?
- Although *L.E.L.* highlights the unhappy situation of the poet, it does not make any explicit reference to her death
  - Why do you think that this is?
  - What do you consider to be the main features of the poem?

# Investigating language and tone

Why do you think that Rossetti later chooses to have L.E.L. as the speaker of the poem?

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- Considering that the poem was composed over twenty years after L.E.L'.s death, what effect does this have?
- Write down the places in the poem where the voice changes
  - Why do you think that a change in voice is important at these points?

## Investigating structure and versification

- Find instances of repetition in the poem
  - How do these instances affect your reading of *L.E.L.*?
- Look at the punctuation throughout the poem
  - Write down any points you find interesting
- Note that many of the lines are divided by a colons and commas.
   For instance, 'All love, are loved, save only I; their hearts / Beat warm with love and joy' (l. 15-16)
  - What is the effect of this punctuation?
  - How does it emphasise meaning and highlight tensions?

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# Investigating imagery and symbolism

- The poem begins by contrasting the society 'Downstairs' with the loneliness of the 'solitary room above' (l. 1-2)
  - How important is place in this poem and why?
- Why do you think that L.E.L. had to disguise the reality of her life?
  - What enables Rossetti to identify L.E.L.'s 'show' as a disguise?
- L.E.L. declares that she 'feel[s] no spring' (I. 8)
  - What is the difference between feeling spring and witnessing it visually?
  - What do you think prevents her from feeling the effects of spring?

#### Investigating themes

- Why do you think that Rossetti's
  L.E.L. chooses to conceal a particular 'truth' (I. 29)?
- What does Rossetti suggest the difficulties are of existing happily both in the public and the private realms?
- What indications can you find that Rossetti is sympathetic to L.E.L.'s plight?

 Why do you think that Rossetti choose to associate herself with L.E.L.?

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
